INTRODUCTION

Democracy Works Foundation (DWF), under the Putting Youth and Women at the Centre of Economic Growth (PYWFIG) Inclusive framework in collaboration with the Financial Services Volunteer Corp (FSVC) under Strengthening Anti-Corruption Efforts Procedures in Southern Africa, are implementing capacity building interventions aimed at strengthening inclusive, transparent, corrupt-free, responsive, good governance and policy-processes around socio-economic development, employability and development. Within this framework, DWF and FSVC have organised a training workshop on "Procurement and beneficial ownership" to enhance the capacity of the Local Government Actors, as well as CSOs and SMMEs. The workshop contributes to enhancing participatory and good governance around promoting transparency around procurement and beneficial ownership. The intervention strategically aligns with the Consortium's overall objectives in strengthening capacities of the Civil Society Organizations (CSOs) and government actors Representatives in championing efforts in combating corruption and building enterprise development infrastructure responsive to women and youth. The training workshop will run for the duration of 3 days in the three districts respectively in partnership with the Directorate on Corruption and Economic Offenses (DCEO) and Procurement Policy and Advisory Department (PPAD).

BACKGROUND

Building on the training workshop that was held for the CSOs and SMMEs on identifying corruption and misconduct in procurement in the public sector, DWF and FSVC in partnership with Directorate on Corruption and Economic Offenses (DCEO) and Procurement Policy and Advisory Department (PPDA) will implement the training workshop on procurement and beneficial ownership for Local Government as well as CSOs. The new Public Procurement Act 2023 has now been passed in Lesotho, making the room for the creation of institutions necessary to ensure the procurement system's integrity is maintained and potential violations in the tender industry in Lesotho prohibited. Procurement was regulated and governed by the Public Procurement Regulations 2007, its 2018 Amendment and the Public Financial Management and Accountability Act, 2011. The Public Procurement Act, 2023 is meant to establish a public procurement authority, a body corporate, to regulate public procurement structures by providing procedures, processes and regulation of procurement of good, works and services in order to optimize efficiency in public procurement and obtain value for money the government. The development attributed to the new procurement act combined the 2007 act with the 2018 amendment and 2011 act into one legislation. Due to the ensuing opaqueness of the previous acts with no authoritative institution.

Public procurement refers to the acquisition of goods and services by government in order to facilitate the efficient operationalisation of the state machinery. Public procurement however beyond transactions to acquire extends commodities to the relationship between the state and its suppliers and between the state commodity transaction. Corruption which is critical in public procurement policy because of the huge quantities of commodities often being transacted and the volume of money involved in the procurement process results sometimes with tax evasion and money laundering. This creates substantial opportunities for the public official with the propensity to be corrupt because of the high profitability attached to these large procurements.

BACKGROUND

According to the director of the Directorate on Corruption and Economic Offenses (DCEO), public procurement in Lesotho is the most vulnerable area to corruption, and public procurement cases form 99% of corruption cases handled by the DCEO in 2016. Political agents in Lesotho often condemn corruption and reiterate a commitment to a corruptionfree procurement process. However, overt corruption that permeates all sectors in the country contracts this narrative as more Government Representatives and politically exposed persons are associated and charged with corruption, money laundering and tax evasion. A beneficial owner is a natural person who ultimately owns or controls a legal entity, either directly or indirectly, politically exposed or not. Beneficial ownership transparency and procurement are interconnected when it comes to advancing efforts against corruption, particularly in the context of ensuring integrity and accountability in government transactions. According to the World Bank study, 70% of all grand corruption cases involve the use of anonymously owned companies. Insufficient transparency in beneficial ownership not only aids in the laundering of corruption proceeds but also severely impedes and erodes the economy. Pursuant to advancing governance by employing anti-corruption strategies and procedures, DWF and FSVC in partnership with DCEO and PPAD will hold the training workshop for the Local Government Actors as well as CSO in Leribe, Butha-Buthe and Maseru to truly appreciate the new procurement act 2023 and intrinsically understand how the beneficial ownership information centrally governed and public available to the public can enhance participatory governance and prevent corruption.

The training workshop will be held in Leribe on the 3rd to 5th June 2024, Butha-Buthe on the 6th to 8th June 2024 and in Maseru on the 10th to 12th June 2024.

GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

The three-day training workshop aims to train and strengthen the capacity of Local Government and CSOs in improving their advancing anti-corruption knowledge on through beneficial ownership transparency and the new legislation on the procurement that has been passed recently in parliament. Through the Public Procurement Advisory Department, the Local Government Actors' knowledge will be Enhanced on the new procurement Act 2023 with the establishment of the new institutions to be established to ensure the procurement system's integrity and potential violations in the tender industry in Lesotho is maintained. Building on the previously workshop, the training workshop will continue to strengthen and upskill the participants knowledge on anti-corruption efforts on beneficial ownership and its application in Lesotho and how it reinforces and promotes good governance.

participants will have the better understanding of the nuts and bolts of procurement act, clean and transparent procurement, e-procurement and beneficial ownership transparency beneficial and politically ownership of the exposed individuals. The training will be participatory to create a learning environment and a culture of information sharing amongst the relevant stakeholders includina government representatives. The workshop will also cover poorly managed procurement beneficial ownership impacts on responsive enterprise development and economy at large. The training is expected to cover approximately 120 participants in the three districts.
